












Homelessness

In the 2011 Census the greater Brisbane Region had a total of Brisbane City was recorded as having a total of 7299 homeless people.



Homelessness

- There were 4324 homeless people in Brisbane City (2011) compared to 4175 in 2006
- Of these, 1943 (45%) were identified in inner Brisbane. This compares to 1878 in 2006.
- In Queensland there was a reduction in rough sleepers overall (from 7247 to 6813 between 2006-2011)
- There was significant growth in the number of people counted as living in severely overcrowded dwellings between 2006-2011 (31,531-41,391).














High or very high psychological distress 2007/2008




High or very high psychological distress 2007/2008 (rate / 100)



Mental health care plan





Under 1 Roof improving client outcomes through case coordination

- Every two weeks for two hours
- Front line service delivery
- Front line staff
- Agenda: Clients referred whose circumstances are complex and/or who are assessed as potentially benefitting from a coordinated approach (informed consent)
- Housing providers, tenant advice workers and support providers attend (Government and non-government)



Data notes

Psychological distress (synthetic prediction), 2007-08

High or very high levels of psychological distress, persons aged 18 years and over Compiled by PHIDU using data estimated from the 2007-08 National Health Survey (NHS), ABS (unpublished); and ABS Estimated Resident Population, average of 30 June 2007 and 2008. The data have been derived from the Kessler Psychological Distress Scale-10 items (K-10), which is a scale of non-specific psychological distress based on 10 questions asked of respondents about negative emotional states in the 4 weeks prior to interview. 'High' and 'Very high' distress are the two highest levels of distress categories (of a total of four categories).

All PHIDU data referring to statistical local area group *Herston/Newstead* includes Bowen Hills, Fortitude Valley, Herston and Newstead
